## Before the Meeting Preparation:

Write in date of Meeting # 5 on the the Girl Scout Promise and Law worksheet (in back of packet) and copy enough sheets for each girl in the troop plus three or four extras in case more girls join the troop.

For "Kim's Games", gather a Brownie Girl Scout handbook, Brownie Girl Scout pin, Brownie Try-It, Girl Scout membership pin, a Brownie Girl Scout Beanie, a Kaper Chart and other items unique to Girl Scouting (check with another Brownie Girl Scout leader, a Troop Consultant or the OCC to access items that you don't have) along with something to use to cover the items (tablecloth/sheet).

Cut large pieces of paper in triangles. Make enough triangles to have two per girl.

## **Goal: Relating to Others**

### Supplies and Equipment

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#### **Pre-Meeting Activity - approximately 5 minutes**

Girls pick up their name tags to wear if still necessary. Set out triangles of paper and the crayons, markers or colored pencils. Girls are to draw something in the middle of the triangle that they like to do or think would be fun to do.

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#### **Opening Activity - approximately 5 minutes**

Ask girls to find a buddy and stand facing each other. Announce that part of Girl Scouting is making new friends and learning more about old friends. Give girls one minute to discover something about another member of the troop that they don't already know. Form a circle and ask girls to introduce their friend including the new fact they just discovered. Distribute the Girl Scout Promise to girls who can read. Ask the girls to read the Promise. Demonstrate the Girl Scout sign as the Promise is read. Girls should join in showing the Girl Scout sign.

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#### **Brownie Ring (Business & Snack) - approximately 15 minutes**

Tell girls to bring their drawings and to join you in the Brownie Ring. Explain that in Girl Scouting girls do things in their meetings that are of interest and fun. One of the ways to determine what to do is to find out what girls like to do so each girl can share her drawing of something she likes to do. Write down each idea shared. Show the girls the *Try-Its for Brownie Girl Scouts*. Pass out treat. Ask "How did Brownie Girl Scouts get their name"? Read the first half of the Brownie Girl Scout story then ask the question a second time.

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#### **Main Activity - approximately 40 minutes**

Create a Kim's Game showing different things that are unique to Girl Scouting and specifically Brownie Girl Scouting. Place the Brownie Girl Scout handbook, a Brownie Beanie, the Brownie Girl Scout pin, a Kaper Chart, and a Brownie Girl Scout Try-It on a table which girls can gather around. Cover the items. Once all girls are present, uncover the items for one minute and re-cover. Ask girls to name one item. Explain the significance of the item or ask girls if they know the significance of the item. Repeat game, each time asking girls to name an additional item.

Small cloth to cover everything

Play People-to-People. Pairs stand facing each other. One person is the caller. She calls out different body parts which the pairs touch together. At "People-to-People", pairs must find a new partner. The caller also pairs up. The person left becomes the new caller and the game continues.

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#### **Clean-Up - approximately 10 minutes**

Everyone helps! Assign specific tasks to individual girls.

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#### **Closing Activity - approximately 5 minutes**

Re-form in a circle with hands clasped. Pass out Girl Scout Promise and Law and say it together. Request that girls learn it before the next meeting. Make a Friendship Circle by crossing arms right over left and clasp the hands of the girl to either side. Teach and sing *Make New Friends* and twist out of the circle by ducking under the crossed arms and turning 180° while still holding hands. Send a slip home with girls notifying parents that they will be going outside during the next meeting and to dress appropriately.

Kaper is Girl Scout lingo for chores or tasks. Girls are assigned kapers for each meeting. They could be responsible for doing a flag ceremony, teaching a game, sweeping the floor, cleaning the bathroom, and helping leaders to pass out or collect materials

One way of assigning kapers is the "It" Can. Make an "It" can or bag and a "Did It" can or bag using a small container or paper bag. Cover the can with paper and decorate. Put the names of all the girls on index cards or popsicle sticks and place them in the "It" can. Whenever you need a chore done or a special help, pull out an index card or stick. Put the used index card or stick in the "Did It" can until all index cards or sticks are used, then start over. (reference - *The Guide for Brownie Girl Scout Leaders*, p. 23)
